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10th Annual Wisconsin Charter Schools Conference to take place March 22-23rd, 2010 in Madison

"QUALITY HAPPENS" is Theme of This Year's Interactive Conference

Madison, WI – March 12, 2010 – The 2010 Wisconsin Charter Schools Conference will take place March 22-23rd at the Monona Terrace Community and Convention Center in downtown Madison. The Conference will feature interactive sessions; hands-on examples of innovative learning in classrooms; networking; a coaching room open throughout the conference; and keynote speakers that highlight the importance of quality in and around each classroom, and the impact that quality has on the learning of students everywhere.

Featured speakers at the conference include **Greg Richmond**, President and founding board member of the National Association of Charter School Authorizers and establisher of the Chicago Public School District's Charter Schools Office; **Ursula Wright**, the Chief Operating Officer for the National Alliance for Public Charter Schools; **Sarah Archibald** of the Consortium for Policy Research in Education at UW-Madison and the Value-Added Research Center; and **Richard Halverson**, an associate professor of Educational Leadership and Policy Analysis at the University of Wisconsin-Madison.

John Gee, Executive Director of the Wisconsin Charter Schools Association, spoke about this year's event. "This year's Conference is especially important for all public schools across the state, including public charter schools," Gee stated. "Now that Wisconsin will not have access to the Race to the Top funds, the focus of our state will turn to the \$86 million in DPI (Department of Public Instruction) funds that are to be used over the next five years to start 130 new charter schools.

"This conference will provide the tools, resources, and connections to ensure these new schools will focus on quality," Gee continued. "The bottom line is that for anyone who is looking to start a new

charter school, is looking to enhance an existing charter school, or wants to apply learnings from charter schools to traditional public school settings, this conference is the place to obtain all the needed information and to meet the appropriate people."

Monday afternoon will feature a special session to include hands-on exhibitions of academic projects, and approximately 50 charter school students will be in attendance. These students and their projects will showcase the wide range curriculum and teaching methods that quality public charter schools employ across the state.

The Conference will run from 7:30 a.m. – 7 p.m. on Monday, March 22nd, and from 7:30 a.m. - 4 p.m. on Tuesday, March 23rd. Registration is available on-line at the WCSA website and at the door. Keynote speakers, mini-conference sessions and hands-on demonstrations are scheduled throughout both days, with set times for keynote speakers to address the entire conference audience. About Greg Richmond

Greg Richmond was a founding board member of the National Association of Charter School Authorizers (NACSA), serving as the chair of the board from 2000-2005. In 2005 he became NACSA's full-time President. Under his full-time leadership, NACSA's national influence has expanded substantially, including a significant role in the re-opening of New Orleans schools as charter schools, in-depth training of California Department of Education staff, a multi-authorizer training and development project in New York City, and multi-year projects in Florida and Ohio.

From 1994 to 2005, Richmond worked for the Chicago Public Schools, where he established the district's Charter Schools Office. Under his leadership, Chicago was the first urban school district in the nation to release an RFP, requesting educators and community organizations to start charter schools. He also established the nation's first district-funded capital loan fund for charter schools and developed model accountability and monitoring practices.

From 2003 to 2005, he launched Chicago's Renaissance 2010 initiative as the district's Chief Officer for New Schools Development, under Arne Duncan, then the CEO of the Chicago Public Schools. In that capacity he continued to work with the district's charter schools, as well as small schools, contract schools and new, autonomous district-operated schools.

Richmond serves on many boards and committees, including the Aspen Institute's Commission on No Child Left Behind, Tulane University's Cowen Institute for Public Education Initiatives, and the National Board for Professional Teaching Standards Advanced Certification for Educational Leaders Steering Committee and the Haitian Development Fund.

About Ursula Wright

Ursula Wright Ursula Wright is the Chief Operating Officer for the National Alliance for Public Charter Schools. Her primary responsibilities include partnering with her direct reports to develop and implement the programmatic aspects of the Alliance's strategy and annual budget. Before assuming her current position in February 2009, Ursula served as the Chief Financial Officer at the National Alliance for Public Charter Schools for three years.

Prior to joining the Alliance, Ursula worked in the private sector for more than a decade. Her most notable positions leveraged her expertise in corporate finance, operations, and business development at some of the nation's most recognized firms, including The Chase Manhattan Bank, Pricewaterhouse Coopers, Cassidy & Associates, and a General Electric subsidiary.

Throughout her career, Ursula has made the time to give back to her surrounding communities. One of her most notable accomplishments is serving as a founding trustee of Achievement Preparatory Academy – a charter middle school located in the eighth ward of Washington, D.C.

Sarah Archibald is passionate about reforming the public schools such that all children have the opportunity to get a great education. Thoroughly educated at the University of Wisconsin-Madison, Sarah has a Bachelor's Degree in Political Science, a Master's in Policy Analysis and a Ph.D. in Educational Leadership and Policy Analysis. For more than ten years, she worked in education research, primarily at the Consortium for Policy Research in Education at UW-Madison but also at the Value-Added Research Center. Her research delved into such issues as resource allocation, school reform, professional development, school finance adequacy, teacher effectiveness, human capital management, charter schools and more.
