Ed Hughes responses February 17, 2011

- 1. For proposed school boundary changes, I'd want to apply the seven "Considerations when Redrawing Boundary Lines" approved by the school board in 2004. They are:
 - A. Every attempt will be made to keep bus routes no more than 45 minutes in duration one way.
 - B. When redrawing boundary lines, current attendance area islands and optional areas will be reduced wherever possible and new ones will not be created.
 - C. No student will be required to change schools, as a result of boundary line changes, more than once during his/her elementary years.
 - D. Grandfathering 4th- and 5th-grade students will be considered when boundary lines are redrawn, and every effort will be made to allow 5th graders to remain at their school.
 - E. School size of two sections per grade level to a maximum of 650 students.
 - F. Every attempt will be made to avoid creating schools with high concentrations of low-income families.
 - G. Efforts will be made to keep geographically and historically defined neighborhoods together and to consider the proximity of students to a school when redrawing boundary lines.

I would also consider the feedback and views of any working group that has been studying the issues, as well the views of affected families and other stakeholders.

- 2. I don't anticipate we'll be closing any schools. To my mind, the relatively limited savings that are achievable through such a move are likely to be greatly outweighed by the disruption and inconvenience such a decision would cause.
- 3. I don't anticipate that we will have to make any additional cuts to our current budget. At this point, budget cuts for 2011-2012 seem more likely to be dictated by the legislature than determined by the school board, but I'll attempt to exercise whatever discretion we have in this area to minimize cuts that would adversely affect the classroom.

- 4. There are all kinds of programs that I would like to see expanded, if we had the resources to do it. These would include our alternative programs, our summer school offerings, the AVID program, and technology instruction.
- 5. One of the primary obligations of the District is to provide a safe and secure environment for students and teachers, both because we require safe and orderly places for learning and also because perceptions about school safety contribute, perhaps inordinately, to the community's impressions of our schools. I support the District's Positive Behavior Intervention System approach and the addition of personnel to deal with discipline-related issues in the high schools and middle schools. It is key that we have a firm and uniform approach to discipline issues, with consistent rules applied consistently to all students, and that all personnel in a school are aligned on their discipline responsibilities.
- 6. If health insurance is a mandatory subject of bargaining, then health insurance provided to District employees should be mutually selected through collective bargaining. If it is a prohibited subject of bargaining, as is currently proposed in the legislature, it will not be. Since as a school board member I'm part of management, so I'd prefer flexibility in determining how health insurance fits into the package of salary and benefits the school district provides.
- 7. We need to pursue a broad array of strategies to address the needs of our students of color who are not achieving to their potential. The school district's strategic plan calls for implementing culturally relevant teaching strategies, in particular addressing African American students, across the content areas to enhance all students' achievement levels. Pilot programs for research-based implementation of this goal are underway at Mendota, Falk and Lowell elementary schools. We'll see if these programs actually help our students learn more effectively. If they do, we should expand the beneficial aspects of the program more widely throughout the district. It will require time, attention and hard work on the part for students who are behind to catch up. The sort of "double dosing" in math, reading and language skills that is currently in place at Blackhawk and Sherman seems like a smart strategy. Four-year-old kindergarten should certainly help level the field a bit for students entering kindergarten. We should certainly maintain our focus on literacy and small class sizes in the early years. We should also take a good look at our literacy programs and see what improvements we could make. We need to track carefully the impact of the programs we try so that we can expand those that are working and modify or abandon those that are not. We also need to do as much as we can to encourage all our students to take the most challenging classes that are appropriate to their skill level. We would also benefit from effective outreach strategies and community partnerships to encourage families who may

- not have had positive school experiences in the past to support their children's learning.
- 8. In the abstract, increased planning time for teachers would certainly be a good thing. In light of all the competing demands for our limited resources and the severe budget challenges we will soon be confronting, I doubt that we will be able to do much about it anytime soon. I support the institution this year of professional collaboration time for middle and high school teachers.
- 9. I have not previously been in favor of withdrawing from WASB, but I am dismayed with WASB statements regarding the budget reconciliation bill and so would be willing to look at the costs and benefits of continuing our membership.
- 10. Public funding from all sources state, federal and local. The state should certainly provide sufficient funds to cover the costs of state-imposed mandates. The state funding formula should also be changed. For example, I don't think that school districts that have higher than average property values should lost state funding if they spend more than 90% of the state average per pupil. I haven't looked at the issue of student fees and don't have a view on whether they are too high or too low.

- 15. I have and will continue to seek advice from all Board members on particular issues. Similarly, I am open to suggestions and advice from any MMSD staff members. The wider we can cast our net in terms of getting feedback from teachers and staff, the better and more informed our decisions can be.

- 18. I don't feel that I have sufficient knowledge or expertise to comment intelligently on the district's inclusion practices. I certainly think Title I students should be in the regular education classroom. As to EEN and ESL students, I have to defer to the experts, though I do believe that our choices in this area should be driven by evidence of what works most effectively rather than by ideology.
- 19. The cluster grouping approach included in the District's TAG plan makes sense to me. I support offering accelerated class options in core subjects to all our high school students.
- 20. I'm comfortable with the approach outlined in the TAG plan. I'd like to see us do a better job in identifying students of promise who do not have parents advocating on their behalf and then providing appropriately challenging work for those students, as well as all other high-achieving students.
- 21. "Yes" to the first three, though I'm not entirely sure what "implementation of State Statutes" entails. As to merit pay, the concept sounds good in theory but I believe it would be quite a challenge to agree on a merit pay scheme that is fair, even-handed and meaningful.

Elementary Schools are the major anchor for a neighborhood. Unless our neighborhoods recycle and flourish we will lose the inner city vibrancy that Madison needs. Therefore, at this time, I cannot imagine voting for closing a school. It would, in effect, be a long-term solution to a short-term problem. I have been representing MMSD on the city ad hoc housing committee. We will be sending a new housing policy to the Mayor soon. It will be based on individual school attendance areas with changing numbers of free and reduced lunches being used as a first barometer/indicator for housing policies.

3. If the School Board finds it necessary, due to the State-imposed revenue controls, to make further budget cuts to the 2011-12 budget, what criteria would you, as a Board member, use to make such a judgment? **Each budget session, I will carefully explore any and all cuts proposed**

by the administration and other Board members, using the direct impact on our students and teachers as my primary criteria.

This Governor and legislature are going to push every school district and union. We have to fight against their heinous proposals. I intend to be in the front line of that opposition.

- 4. Identify specific MMSD programs and/or policies which you believe should to be modified, re-prioritized, or eliminated, and explain why. Last year's biased anti- Reading Recovery report has made me more aware of the dangers of one-sided action plans. This is why the Board has asked for an entire study of our current literacy program. This Report is due next month. Obviously, we have to seriously study the HS Redesign. Progress reports are regularly asked about the Fine Arts, Math and TAGs Reports.
- 5. What should the District do to reduce violence/assure that proper discipline and safety (of the learning and working environment) is maintained in our schools?

The PBS program is beginning to have a positive effect on discipline but, of course, this needs to be continually followed up on. The new Phoenix program is beginning (with some birth pains) to accomplish its goals. I still believe that the bottom line is that our schools must be kept safe for all students and staff or no learning will take place. Expulsions must be a last resort, but if it effectuates a decline in student or staff stress, as a result of a student's excessive threats or actual behavior, it is an absolute necessity.

I have pushed and will continue to do so, to have staff input in all disciplinary matters, including behavior codes.

The Board has just received a new Report on Safety from Luis Yudice and it updates our needs in terms of the increasingly urban district that we are becoming.

The most important work being done today is Andreal Davis' work with cultural relevance. I have asked that it be expanded from Falk, Hawthorne, and Mendota to additional elementary schools. This program and its expansion, eventually into the Middle School, as well as AVID programs on 6-8 levels should eventually have an effect on HS success for our low achieving students. This will take time to filter up through the system.

JoAnne Kloppenburg

1. Why are you seeking this position?

People around the state urged me to run for the Court and are supporting my candidacy because Wisconsin residents want a Supreme Court that is fair, impartial and focused on the important work justices are elected to do. Every Wisconsin resident deserves a fair day in Court. My broad legal background, my extensive courtroom experience, my independence and my commitment to running a campaign free of special interest money and big spending uniquely qualify me to serve on the Court.

I am a litigator and prosecutor at the Department of Justice (1989-present). My legal background is broad and deep and includes constitutional, appellate, civil, environmental, administrative, and criminal law. I have extensive courtroom experience in Circuit Court, the Court of Appeals and the Supreme Court. I graduated with honors from UW Law School (1988) and have an undergraduate degree from Yale (1974) and an MPA from Princeton (1976). I was a law clerk for Chief Judge Barbara Crabb, and interned for Chief Justice Shirley Abrahamson. My husband and I served in the Peace Corps in Botswana (1976-1979). I've taught at the UW Law School since 1990, and I am a mentor with the Dane County Bar Association, on the board of my neighborhood association, and an ESL tutor.

The Supreme Court decides cases that help establish precedent, resolve significant legal issues and provide guidance to other courts and attorneys throughout the state. It is important to remember, however, that in every case — behind the dry legal language and the legal arguments — there are people: people and families whose lives are affected by the actions judges take and the decisions judges make. The effect of the law on people's lives is profound and powerful. It is imperative that Wisconsin residents have confidence in the judiciary as independent decision makers, not tied to partisan causes. Supreme Court Justices should and must be well versed in the law and committed to applying it fairly.

2. Contrast/Compare yourself with your opponent(s)

Justice Prosser's campaign has said Justice Prosser should be elected to "protect the conservative majority on the court" and because Prosser and the Court will then be able to act as a "complement" to the Republican governor and legislature. During the campaign Justice Prosser himself has promised he will "work" with the legislature and governor. Justice Prosser's partisan, Republican background is well known: Republican member of the assembly; speaker of the house; appointed to the Court by Tommy Thompson. Supreme Court justices should not be furthering the agenda of the Republican governor or legislature, but rather the Court's role is to act as a check and balance against those two branches.

3. Explain your judicial philosophy (focus on education/labor)

Everyone deserves a fair day in court. That begins with judicial elections that are respectful of the voters and run without the runaway spending and partisan-style tactics that have marred recent judicial elections. It continues with Judges who are committed to looking at the facts and the law in each case and not prejudging a case through an ideological, political or partisan lens. And the result should be decisions that are well developed and well grounded, that make common sense and are clear and understandable.

I believe that integrity, independence, intelligence, respect for others, a connection to the community in which one serves and a commitment to public service are what make a good judge. I serve the public both in and outside my work. As an Assistant Attorney General, I am a member of and have served as secretary of my union.

I believe that our courts can be part of the system that ensures that schools are safe places where all children can learn and teachers can teach.

1. What strategies will you introduce to reduce the 6000+ families who move in and out of Madison Public School classrooms each year?

In the last three years more children opted out of the district than all previous years in the history of the district. That contributed to the increase of children from households below the poverty line rising to over 48% of the kids enrolled.

To stabilize our enrollment we need stable families and stable neighborhoods. This will require a collaborate effort between governments, like the city, the county and the school district, as well as the private sector and the non-profits. It means opening Madison's economy to all families, providing stable housing, and building on the assets of our neighborhoods.

One decades old problem is the significant poverty in the Town of Madison. I would work with town officials, and city of Fitchburg officials to see if we could accelerate the annexation of the town so we could provide better services to area residents.

2. What are your plans to decrease the poverty in Madison (i.e. poverty-academic achievement relationship?)

In the 1990's we had something that worked. It was the neighborhood Resource Teams (NRTs). They were deployed into the most economically stressed areas of Madison, usually with populations between 500 to 2,000. Before we implemented the NRT's Madison poverty rate had risen from 23% to 27%. Once these teams comprised of firefighters and nurses, police officers and librarians, building inspectors and nurses were operational, that poverty rate stabilized at 27% for over a decade.

In the last three years that poverty rate increased form 32% to 48%. We can do a lot better and we will. It takes an understanding of how to collaborate in a neighborhood which means being a resource and letting the people design their own community.
